About Museums



Colchester Castle Museum

A visit to Colchester Castle Museum takes you through 2000 years of some of the most important events in British history. Once capital of Roman Britain, Colchester has experienced devastation by Boudica, invasion by the Normans and siege warfare during the English Civil War.

The Castle is the largest keep ever built by the Normans. It was constructed on the foundations of the Roman Temple of Claudius, which can still be seen today. Today, it displays a internationally important Roman and Iron Age British (Celtic) collection, as well as the history of Colchester through to the end of the English Civil War.

Hollytrees Museum

Hollytrees was built in 1718 for Elizabeth Cornelisen and has been home to some of the wealthiest families in Colchester. It became a museum in 1929 and was redisplayed in 2001 with wonderful new hands-on activities to show what home life was like in Colchester over the last 300 years. This vibrant museum highlights home and domestic life, Victorian life and toys.

Tymperleys Clock Museum


This museum is home to a fine display of Colchester-made clocks and watches from the outstanding Mason collection. It is situated in a beautifully restored 15th century timber-framed house with a medieval style herb garden in its grounds.











Access

All museums have full wheelchair access except for visits to the Roman vaults and the roof at the Castle Museum-alternative tours can be organised to accommodate this. Handling objects are available for visually impaired students and those with learning disabilities. Subtitling is available for most of the audiovisuals in Hollytrees and the Castle Museum.



Appropriate galleries

For this visit, the most appropriate resource is the building itself: looking at the features of the Castle for defence and as a home, both inside and outside. We now have a new Norman and Saxon gallery which will compliment this scheme of work. Pupils can experience the new interactive, exciting and dramatic interpretation of the coming of the Normans. Their impact on the Saxon way of life, the differences in lifestyle, hierarchy in society and their varied industries. Investigate the building of Colchester Castle high-lighting the Norman construction and its many interesting features.

Organisation of your visit

We take groups as young as 4 years old who are either studying Castles or Homes as a topic. An Education Assistant leads the group up the Great Staircase; the largest Norman staircase in Europe. The tour continues onto the roof of the Castle with its views of Colchester and surrounding countryside

Colchester Castle is the largest Norman keep ever built and retains many of the features of a traditional Castle. It is therefore an ideal place to visit to see how Colchester developed after the Norman Conquest and what the Castle would have been like when it was first built.







Colchester was the first capital of Roman Britain and our wide-ranging collections reflect its prosperity during the Roman period. The Castle houses collections of internationally important Iron Age and Roman artefacts that are displayed in an easy-to-follow style, with many hands-on activities.

Appropriate galleries include:

Life in Celtic Britain, Roman Invasion, Building of the Roman Town, Roman Homes, Roman Beliefs. Hands-on activities include: try on a Roman helmet and chain mail, coin brass rubbings, handling real Roman pottery.



With this package you receive a timetable for the day which includes a story tour of the Roman vaults underneath the Castle Museum. You are led by an Education Assistant who involves the pupils in finding out about the Iron Age settlements in this area, the Roman invasion and the Boudican revolt.



Package C:

Go underground into the foundations of the Roman Temple plus build a Roman Villa and Iron Age Roundhouse

With this package, you not only go on the story tour in the Roman vaults, but you are also booked into our Activity Room for an hour. We have a model Roman villa and Iron Age roundhouse that the pupils build, as well as hands-on archaeological activities. This session is led by the teachers themselves and as part of the package, we run FREE training sessions before your visit that show you how to run this session and also the best ways to organise your visit around the galleries.
