## Who is it for?

Growing into Leadership is for teachers who want to develop and grow as middle or senior leaders and may be aspiring towards departmental, deputy or headteacher positions.

## How will I and my school benefit?

## Who delivers the course and where?

For four years, Nicki was Assistant Director at the Eastern Leadership Centre and led the successful roll-out of the Leading from the Middle programme. Nicki has been involved in other national programmes for the TDA and NCSL, and has developed several regional programmes for deputy headteachers and other leaders.

Ruth Allen was a headteacher of an 'outstanding' and 'Beacon' primary school. She is now an independent consultant working on a number of NCSL programmes. She carries out mentoring and coaching support in schools and undertakes the assessment and accreditation of School Improvement Partners. She is also currently project managing a new training



programme for secondary teachers in multi-agency partnerships.

## Who is it for? ELC's **Primary Deputy Headteacher Induction** is for

deputy or assistant headteachers in their first or second year of senior leadership, working in the leadership team in a primary setting.

### How will I and my school benefit?

This course is for teachers who want to become effective school leaders, work with teams, evaluate how good their school is and improve on past performance. It will develop the leadership skills and capacity of recently appointed deputy and assistant headteachers, helping especially to distribute leadership and the responsibility for continuous school improvement.

The result will be more effective planning, team building, inspiration, and the confidence to achieve practical results across a range of tasks to move you and your school forward in 2009.

### Who delivers the course and where?

This programme is delivered at the Eastern Leadership Centre, just outside of Cambridge and at the National College for School Leadership, Nottingham. Our tutors are experienced in leading a variety of schools and their knowledge includes today's regulatory framework, working practices, and the range of management skills required to lead a school successfully.

For instance, a lead facilitator on this programme will be Lin Whyte.

Lin Whyte is a practising Primary school headteacher in Cambridgeshire and has led two other schools during a distinguished professional career. She is a trained school improvement partner (SIP) and tutors on two of NCSL's flagship courses: the National Professional Qualification for Headship (NPQH) and Leading from the Middle (LFTM). Alongside her headteacher, facilitator, and SIP roles Lin also writes a variety of governor and curriculum support materials.

Clive Minnican is International Director at the Eastern Leadership Centre, has been a headteacher in two schools and involved in developing and delivering NPQH since 1996. He has worked extensively with school business managers, children's centre leaders and teachers in China, South Africa and across the UK.
