FROM THE CHAIRMAN

The generous support by a number of local businesses and charities together with the continued support by Norfolk County Council meant that our 2002 Festival was able to thrive and prosper. Our finances are now far more secure and the committee has prepared this syllabus with pleasure and confidence.

Independent status brings greater freedom but greater responsibility and we are very grateful for the understanding shown by participants and teachers who sometimes found the venues in 2002 not quite to their liking.

However, we have taken note of comments and suggestions offered and in addition to our continued use of St Andrew's Hall and the Assembly House, classes will also take place in the King of Hearts, The Octagon Chapel, St Peter Mancroft Church and the panelled hall of Notre Dame High School.

All these venues have good acoustics, a good piano and all are regularly used for concerts and recitals by professional and amateur musicians who have come to value their suitability for live music.

There are two new exciting developments for 2003. In addition to the main music events in Norwich and Kings Lynn, we are now also providing a day in Thetford.

Our other new venture is to extend our Festival to include some speech and drama classes, when we shall run a pilot event for 2003 in The Playhouse Theatre, Norwich.

The main Festival is open to amateur musicians of all standards. It is not a competition as there are nor prize winners (except in 2 classes) and therefore no losers. It is an opportunity for musicians to enter designated classes and to be judged by professional and specialist musicians. All entrants are awarded a certificate, classified according to merit and a personal written adjudication on their performance.

By the very nature of the Festival, some classes attract few entrants whilst others appeal to many. In 2002 we had to extend our booking at St Andrew's Hall to accommodate all the choirs! We are more than willing to be flexible to ensure that everyone is catered for.

We aim to promote a Festival which gives pleasure and real value to performers and listeners alike. I would encourage you to enter and to spread the word that Norfolk County Music Festival is keen to welcome new and aspiring musicians of all standards.

This is our 78th Festival. The Festival is truly an open Festival - the only requirement being that amateur status is observed. Schools, colleges, groups of musicians and individuals and families of all ages enter. There are classes for practically all types of musical instruments, combinations of instruments and types of music.

The vision of the Festival founder, Arthur Shorten lives on through the award of the Shorten Cup and the cash prizes each year, kindly donated by his daughter.

Rules of the Festival

- 1 The object of the Festival is to raise the standard of amateur music making by giving its practitioner the opportunity to perform in public and under concert conditions, to benefit both by securing a professional assessment of their work and from the opportunity of hearing their fellow performers.
- 2 The Festival is open to residents of Norfolk and to such others as may be admitted by the Festival Committee.
- 3 Certificates may be awarded in the categories Outstanding Performance, Highly Commended Performance, Commended Performance, and Sound Performance. In classes A1, B1, M1, Q1A and R a certificate will be given but no award shown.
- 4 The Adjudicators may also use the category "Participated but more security needed for a successful performance, if a sufficiently high standard is not achieved. All entrants will receive a written adjudication on application to the appropriate stewards.
- 5 No entrant may discuss any aspect of the Festival with an Adjudicator except at the invitation of the Adjudicator.
- 6 All applications to participate must be made on the Entry Form provided and be returned to the Festival Administrator, Brackendale, Poringland Road, Upper Stoke Holy Cross, Norwich NR14 8 NW, **not later than 30 November 2002.** All applications must be accompanied by the appropriate fee and separate forms must be submitted for each individual entry. Additional copies of the entry form may be obtained from the Festival Secretary at the above address or the form may be photocopied. See Guidance Notes for the Entry Form.
- 7 The Festival reserves the right to refuse entry without assigning any reason.

8 Entry fees cannot be returned.

- 9a Entrants in any classes for choir, orchestra or band other than schools must have been bona fide members of the choir, orchestra or band for a period of at least 2 months prior to the first day of the Festival.
- 9b In the case of school ensembles, regular members of staff may assist where appropriate but they must enter the appropriate classes for schools AND teachers.
- 10 Where more than one test piece is required in any one class, membership of any group taking part must be the same for each test piece performed.
- 11 Entrants will perform only once in each class except for classes K 26 (teacher and pupil).
- 12 Entrants who are not ready to perform when called for will forfeit their right to appear.
- 13 Whilst every effort will be made to adhere to the advertised programme the Festival reserves the right to make modifications.
- 14 Pieces may be heard in whole or in part at the discretion of the Adjudicator. **Repeats will not be considered essential at any time**.
- 15 Only stewards and accompanists will be allowed on the platform with entrants.
- 16 It is regretted that photography, audio and video recordings are not permitted due to the legal requirements of the Performing Rights Society.
- 17 Copies of music should be provided for the adjudicator and, where appropriate, for the accompanist.

- 18 Where no publisher is stated any standard publication will be accepted.
- 19 Participants will not be allowed to perform at any time other than that given for their class as set out in the Programme.
- 20a The Shorten Chamber Ensemble Class, class J1. A Cup and prize money to the value of $\pounds 200$ donated by Olive Shorten may be awarded at the discretion of the Adjudicator. 1st £100 2nd £65 3rd £35.
- 20b The Gwendoline Lee Memorial Prize Class J1. The prize is donated jointly by the Norwich Centre of the Incorporated Society of Musicians and St George's Music Shop and is a voucher exchangeable at St George's Music Shop. It may be awarded at the discretion of the Adjudicator subject to a performance worthy of the award. The winner of the previous year is ineligible to enter this class.

A CHORAL

VENUE: The Hall of Notre Dame School, Surrey Street, Norwich.

DATE/S: Tuesday 18 March *and/or* Wednesday 19 March 2003 and in the evening - 6.30 pm start according to the number of entries.

ADJUDICATOR: Jeffrey Wynn Davies

Jeffrey Wynn Davies continues to enhance his already established reputation as one of this country's busiest and most versatile choral conductors and trainers. Artistic Director of the Association of British Choral Directors Millennium Convention in August last year, he directed five international choirs in the world premiere of Andrew Carter's *The Mystic Trumpeter* in Chester Cathedral - part of the Convention's International Gala Concert.

His award winning vocal group/chamber choir **Canzonetta** – former BBC Sainsbury's Choir of the Year - appears regularly at Manchester's new Bridgewater Hall. Last season's performances there included recitals with Anthony Rolfe Johnson and Wayne Marshall, *Dixit Dominus* with Manchester Camerata, and Britten's *War Requiem* with the **Royal Philharmonic Orchestra**, the **Manchester Chorale** and the **Manchester Boys Choir**. He also directed the adult and children's choruses in the world premiere of Peter Ash's opera *Charlie and the Chocolate Factory*.

This year Canzonetta has broadcast several times on BBC Radio 3, and has made two ITV television appearances. The group's latest CDs feature, respectively, the music of York composer Andrew Carter (a 60th birthday tribute available on the Guild label), and the complete chamber choir music of Carey Blyton for Upbeat.

Jeffrey Wynn Davies also directs the internationally renowned **Manchester Boys Choir**, and the 170 voice **Harrogate Choral Society**. In addition to appearances at the **Cheltenham** and **Harrogate International Festivals**, he has acted as Chorus Director to both **Pavarotti** and **Carreras**. This season includes the Rachmaninov *Vespers* and Dvorak's *Stabat Mater* in Harrogate, the Debussy *Nocturnes* with the BBC Philharmonic Orchestra in Manchester, and recordings of film music for Chandos.

He is in demand as a guest conductor and choral trainer, working again this year for most of the major British choral organisations at weekend workshops etc. He has directed seven choral festivals for the BBC, and has adjudicated at many choral competitions in the UK, Ireland, and also in Scandinavia and South Africa. He has recently sat on the panel of judges at the **National Eisteddfod of Wales**, the **National Festival of Music for Youth**, the **National Male Voice Choir Competition**, and, this season, will adjudicate at the **Malta International Choral Festival** and the **Jersey International Choir Competition**.

His summer **Harrogate Choral Week**, which this year drew 180 singers from all parts of Britain, is now firmly established as a major national choral event. He has served on a number of national bodies, including the **BBC Central Music Advisory Committee.**

This class in intended to provide experience for recently formed choirs. Adjudication only. No class award. Own choice of two contrasting items.

A2 Women's Choirs

A programme of up to 4 songs. Including at least one unison song. Maximum time 12 minutes.

A3 Youth choirs

A programme no longer that 10 minutes.

A4 Barbershop Choirs

A programme no longer than 12 minutes.

A5 A6 Mixed Choirs

A programme of no more than 12 minutes.

A6 Church Choirs

Two contrasting items suitable for use in the context of a religious service.

A7 Madrigal Groups

No more than 2 voices to a part; any combination of voices.

A8 Vocal Ensembles

For groups of ten or under; own choice and not to exceed 10 minutes.

B SCHOOL CHOIRS

VENUE : St Andrew's Hall, Norwich with sessions in both morning and afternoon due the increasing number of entries and larger numbers in the choirs.

DATE/S: Tuesday 18, Wednesday 19 and Thursday 20 March 2003. There will be morning (9.30/10.00 am start) and afternoon sessions (2.00pm start), according to the number of entries.

ADJUDICATOR : Jeffrey Wynn Davies - see details above under Class A

- B1 School Choirs for children up to and including Year 3 Adjudication only. No class award.
 - a) One song based on the theme of fantasy dragons, monsters, dreams, fairies, magic etc.
 - b) Contrasting own choice.
- **B2** School Choirs for children up to and including Year 7 Unison The songs selected should provide opportunities for the choir to demonstrate ability to sing expressively with changes in tempo, dynamics and mood.
 - a) One song about (or from) other countries or other cultures.
 - b) Contrasting own choice.

B3 School Choirs for children up to and including Year 7 – Two Part

Free choice. The songs selected should provide opportunities for the choir to demonstrate ability to sing expressively, with changes in tempo dynamics and mood.

Two contrasting two-part songs and not exceeding 6 minutes in all.

B4 High School Choirs

A programme of not more than 12 minutes in length.

C YOUNG SINGERS

VENUE : The Octagon Chapel, Colegate, Norwich. There are car parks close by and some parking in the road in the evening.

DATE/S: Friday 21 and Saturday 22 March 2003 and with morning (9.30/10.00 am start); afternoon (2.00pm start) and evening(6.30 pm start) sessions according to the number of entries.

ADJUDICATOR : Gaynor Keeble

Gaynor Keeble gained scholarships to the University of Warwick and the Royal Academy of Music. She combines a busy performing career with teaching both privately and at the University of Warwick. She is becoming increasingly in demand as an adjudicator.

Gaynor has also worked extensively with English Touring Opera's Education Programme and was a member of the Welsh National Opera for three years and has worked for the Royal Opera, Opera North, D'Oyly Carte Mid-Wales and English Touring Opera. Roles with these companies include Carmen Marchioness (Daughter of the Regiment), Baba the Turk (Rake's Progress), Mrs Sedley (Peter Grimes), Meg Page (Falstaff), Maddelena (Rigoletto), Marcellina (Marriage of Figaro), Orpheus (Orpheus and Euridece) and Tisbe (Cenerentola).

Concerts include appearances with the London Mozart Player, London Bach Orchestra, CBSO Royal Philarmonic and The Philharmonia. In December 2001 she was the winner of the London Lieder Prize.

Her most recent engagements include the Royal Opera House and a tour to Lyon with the University of Warwick. Forthcoming engagements include Daughter of the Regiment in Switzerland and France.

D ADULT SOLO SINGING

The Official Accompanist is available – see Rule 23 - but singers are encouraged to provide their own accompanist.

VENUE AND ADJUDICATOR AS FOR YOUNG SINGERS ABOVE

D1 20th Century British Song 18 years and over

Any song by one of the following composers:

Britten, Head, Finzi, Quilter, Ireland and Vaughan Williams.

D2 Operatic Solo

Any aria, with or without the preceding recitative, not exceeding 7 minutes in all and including the spoken introduction. Costume and movement are encouraged in this class but it is not compulsory.

D3 Sacred Aria

Any aria, with or without the preceding recitative, from an oratorio or other sacred work. Da Capos should only be sung where the singer wishes to ornament. Not to exceed 6 minutes.

D4 Folk Song

Any traditional unaccompanied folk song.

D5 Lieder

One song of own choice – must be sung in German

D6 Foreign Song

Any song, other than German Lieder, sung in its original language.

D7 Vocal Duets/Trio/Quartet

Classical or from a Musical; not exceeding 4 minutes

D8 Recital Class – 18 years and over

Any two complementary songs selected to make a contrasting programme and not exceeding 10 minutes in total.

D9 Musical Show

Any song from a musical show and not to exceed 6 minutes. Costume and movement are encouraged in this class but it is not compulsory. Please read note on page xxx about Songs from the Shows.

D10 Victorian/Edwardian Ballad

Any ballad by a Victorian or Edwardian composer.

D11 Gilbert and Sullivan and Operetta

Any aria from a Gilbert and Sullivan opera or from any operetta. Not to exceed 6 minutes.

D12 Jazz/Blues

You are encouraged to use individual arrangements of your own choice of songs and your own personal accompanist for this class. Use of other acoustic instruments is also acceptable.

ADJUDICATOR : Bob Armstrong

Bob Armstrong enjoys a reputation as the UK's leading drum teacher and is a full time private music/drums/percussion teacher. He teaches all styles i.e. Jazz, Rock, Latin American and world music. His current teaching practice boasts 85 private pupils ranging from the ages of 11 to 35 years of age.

Bob has taught many famous drummers who are currently playing with some of the top bands in the world. He is also drum teacher and advisor to all the drummers with the National Youth Jazz Orchestra and at one time was Professor of percussion at Trinity College of Music in London.

He has studied Irish music and the Bodhran (Irish Drum) with Mel Mercier, Head of Percussion, Cork University, John Joe Kelly, six times all Ireland Bodhran champion, Tommy Hayes, world renowned Irish percussionist. He has run Bodhran workshops and seminars in East London and East Anglia and has conducted several Bodhran workshops at Drum Camp 2000 in Norfolk.

30 years a professional musician, Bob has played with and for Tom Jones, David Essex, Morcambe and Wise, 11 years with Roy Castle with whom he had the honour of performing in four Royal Command Performances. From here on the list is endless!

West End theatre includes Evita, Jesus Christ Superstar, Cats, Starlight Express, Mutiny, Singing in the Rain and La Cage au Folle. At one time No.1 drummer for Andrew Lloyd Webber's company The Really Useful Group for whom he went to Tokyo to record the music for the world tour and Australian tour of Starlight Express.

Duncan Beat began his professional musical career at the age of fifteen when he joined the band of the Royal Artillery (Woolwich) playing the clarinet, violin and saxophone. His experience of playing the orchestral repertoire, combined with the military/wind band and dance music, eventually led to a three year course of instruction as a Student Bandmaster at the Royal Military School of Music, Kneller Hall, where he studied conducting, harmony and orchestration. In common with his fellow students, Duncan was also required to play all other woodwind, brass and percussion instruments.

Following graduation from Kneller Hall, Duncan went on to command and conduct the band of the Black Watch, Royal Army Ordnance Corps and Scots Guards. He rounded off his army career by being appointed Director of the Royal Military School of Music, Kneller Hall and was responsible for the training of all army musicians and Bandmasters.

Following retirement from the army, Duncan accepted the appointment as Director of the Band of the Metropolitan Police, which he conducted for the next eight years, presenting concerts, on a daily basis, to all sections of the community in Great London.

Duncan takes a keen interest in young musicians and, as well as teaching the clarinet and saxophone, he holds the appointment of Chairman of the Richmond upon Thames Performing Arts Festival. He also acts as coach to the Independent Association of Preparatory Schools music courses and conducts the Wind Band of Imperial College. At the other end of the age span he coaches and conducts a small wind band Chelsea Pensioners.

Duncan has had the good fortune to be invited to adjudicate in many parts of the country and was also privileged to adjudicate the Zimbabwe Festival in Harare.

This was followed by 4 years of study at the Guildhall School of Music and Drama in London , where her cello professor was Stefan Popov.

On graduating, Kay began to build a career combining teaching and performing. Initially teaching cello in surrey and Sussex Schools, she established a private practice which is still ongoing.

Kay has taught a wide range of students of differing standards and abilities, not to mention age-range! Many of her students have won awards, scholarships and places in national orchestras. The quality of her teaching, as demonstrated by her students, in articles she has written on teaching and in workshops she has given, have earned her great respect from within the teaching profession and also has attracted favourable acclaim from world-class performers and teachers.

As a performer, Kay freelanced as an orchestral player and has also given recitals both as a soloist and ensemble player. After a break of a few years to concentrate on her family, she is now involved with the Sussex Piano Trio, which has been enthusiastically received. The Trio has collaborated with composers such as Howard Blake and Gillian Carcas on their music.

Kay became an adjudicator member of the British Federation of Festivals in 1997 and undertook the Post graduate Certificate in Adjudication in 1999/2000. She lives in Sussex with her husband and their 2 young children.

He is no stranger to the bold and innovative – on acquiring a cassette recording and piano score from the composer Malcolm Arnold for a "lost" musical (Parasol) from the 1960's, Kenneth reconstructed the full score and produced the world stage premiere to great critical acclaim.

Since retiring from full time teaching as Director of Music at Wymondham College in 1999, Kenneth adjudicates for the Federation of Festivals and for the National Music for Youth regional auditions.

In composing commissions, Kenneth has just had "Contemplations upon a Requiem" for piano and orchestra, which is a companion work for the Mozart Requiem, premiered in Norwich and has just completed a Brass Band Suite for a local band. Now follows the immensely challenging task of a "Clarinet Concerto" for Mandy Burvill to be played at the Wymondham Symonphony Orchestra's 20th anniversary in 2004.

Certificates and Adjudication - some useful information

Norfolk County Music Festival is not an examination – the emphasis is on enjoyment and learning. Therefore the adjudicators use their time to talk and to explain how you can achieve an even better performance.

In classes where certificates are awarded – these are most classes and those classes that are adjudication only are indicated - then a grading system is used rather than close marking. The categories are:

Outstanding – artistically and technically Highly Commended – technically correct with evidence of artistic interpretation Commended Performance – a correct and creditable performance Sound Performance Participated – more security needed for a successful performance

The adjudicator may use his or her discretion to award Highly Commended Plus and Commended Plus where the performance merits this but is not *quite* the standard for the higher category. Feedback from adjudicators tells us that they appreciate this flexibility and they usually explain their decision making to entrants.
