

The Diana, Princess of Wales Memorial Award for Young People is inclusive – we want to give the Award to as many young people as possible. All nominees who meet the criteria will receive an Award.

With you, we celebrate the finest young people in the country.

Criteria

Schools and colleges can nominate a pupil, or small group of pupils (maximum 6), aged 12-18 who have made an outstanding contribution to their school or community by:

- * improving the life of others
- * enhancing their school or community
- showing outstanding qualities in overcoming adverse circumstances. (This should include an element of helping or inspiring others.)

Each school can nominate once in every academic year. All pupils nominated who meet one or more of the above criteria will receive an Award.

Nominations can only be made through schools and colleges. Refer to the **case studies** inside for an indication of the kinds of activity the Award recognises.

The Diana, Princess of Wales Memorial Award for Young People considers every nomination and is responsible for the final decision on making an Award.

What Form Does the Award Take?

Each Award Holder will receive a certificate. The school will also receive a certificate to mark its involvement.

All Award Holders and schools also receive a termly newsletter and the chance to take part in any Award activities.

Certificates and newsletters will be issued before the end of each term. The deadlines for nominations in the academic year 2002/3 are: 15 November 2002; 14 March 2003; and 20 June 2003.

What Are the Benefits of Nominating for the Award?

Nominating for the Diana Award will:

- enable your school to celebrate pupils' wonderful achievements
- encourage other young people to take part in similar activities
- * give practical meaning and profile to citizenship.

What Do I Do Next?

1. FORM A NOMINATIONS GROUP

This group will choose which pupil(s) to nominate for an Award. The group should:

- * have four or five members from different parts of the school community
- include pupil representation whenever possible (e.g. a member of the school council).

The Nominations Group should consult as widely as possible to choose a student or group of students.

2. CHOOSE YOUR AWARD HOLDER(S)

The group should look at:

- * how long the activity has lasted
- * the impact of the activity
- the age and personal/social circumstances of the pupil(s) and their personal commitment.

Remember you cannot put forward more than six students in a group and that they must all be taking part in the same activity.

Nominations should not be made as an incentive or encouragement to pupils to improve or sustain behaviour.

The Headteacher or Deputy Headteacher should sign the nomination form. Once we receive it, we will inform you in writing whether your nomination has been approved or not. We suggest you only tell your pupil(s) of their nomination once approval has been confirmed.

Pontarddulais Comprehensive School, SWANSEA

Anne Marie Jones, Tara Davies and Shaun Jarret have transformed the journey to school for the 300 pupils who rely on school buses to travel to and from the surrounding villages. They set up a system to improve behaviour on the buses as children were regularly bullied, and the bus companies complained about pupils who smoked, swore and refused to sit down. In consultation with other pupils they agreed a new code of conduct. They raised £1,200 to produce bus passes with photo ID and initiated a monitoring system. Breaking a rule on the bus warrants cutting one corner off the pass, and if all four corners are cut off, the pupil is banned from using the bus. Thanks to the outstanding efforts of Anne Marie, Tara and Shaun, the journey to and from school is much safer and more pleasant. Since the scheme began not one pass has been clipped.

Acland Burghley School, LB OF CAMDEN

Danny Stanton is quadriplegic and only able to communicate with facial movements (raising his eyes) or via a 'lightwriter' – a small computer with a keyboard, which Danny activates with his head pointer. Danny is the first pupil at Acland Burghley with complex physical problems. He was nominated for the Diana Award for his personal progress against the odds and for inspiring others – he is a gifted poet.

Danny's friends are also exceptional students. Liam Dolan, Kiyonori Matsui, Lee Hudson, Ronnie Brown and Hamid Tahri congregate in Danny's room during break and lunch times to socialise, play games or just read. They are outstanding because they understand his needs and are able to communicate with him without assistance. They were nominated in recognition of their supportive, caring and loyal friendships.

Moat Community College, LEICESTER

Qasim Azam, Zibya Mussa, Anjna Gohil, Sunita Bhatti, Mariyam Haji and Mariyah Kazi set up a peer counselling scheme to help pupils who are being bullied, are unhappy, or don't have anyone to talk to. They sacrificed many lunchtimes to offer support and counselling, attend training, and promote their service to other students. In particular they help the many students who have fled their countries because of war or natural disasters – e.g. Kosovans, Somalis and Montserratians – and find it hard to settle into a new school environment.

'It is extremely important for young people to help other young people and reduce bullying, because a child comes to school, just like us, to learn. If someone is bullying them then they will not feel like coming to school.'
