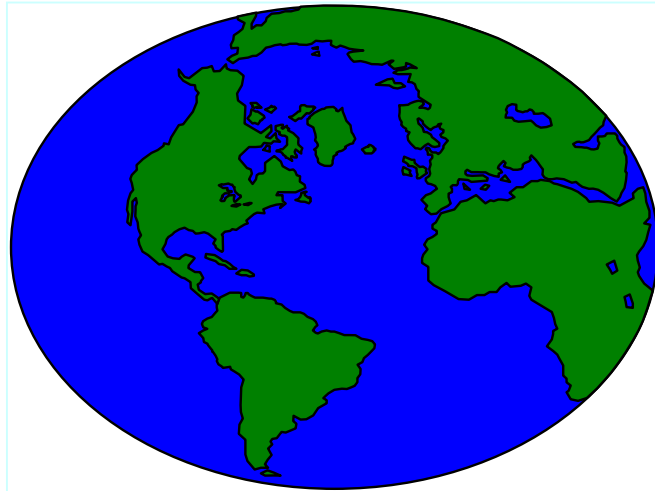

We are advertising the Festival well in advance so that as many schools as possible have an opportunity to come. Early booking is advisable, especially as we have been oversubscribed for the last two years. Places will be allocated on a first-come, first-served basis. The fee is £4 per pupil. This is an increase on previous events as NEAD no longer has a grant from the Community Fund which subsidised those festivals.

Although formal events start at 12 noon, schools can arrive from 11.00 to picnic on the field.
