

'World Voices' reaches out www.nead.org.uk/artists.htm

Artists, performers, musicians, dancers and craftspeople from many countries and cultures around the world have enriched learning in Norfolk schools over the last 3½ years under a project called 'World Voices'. This was run by NEAD and funded by the Community Fund. While funding for the project has now ceased, it has lately been expanded to include people other than those from countries of the South who have knowledge of the world, and the skills with which to share this in schools.

The project has increased both the wealth of available knowledge and the opportunities for a variety of schools work. Each available skilled individual now has an entire page on the NEAD website. This provides details of the individual and of the activities they offer, as well as indicating the development issues that their work might relate to. Making this information available on the Web – rather than in booklet form – saves paper and expense and allows it to be updated on an ongoing basis, helping the service continue and grow in future years.

Some 'World Voices' are volunteers who come into schools without charge (save for expenses); others are paid professionals. Have a look at the website and get a feel for how these 'World Voices' might benefit your school.

Changes to NEAD's Library

In the last two years we have removed almost all the books from our shelves in order to concentrate on teaching resources for all Key Stages and youth work. Some of our resources were outdated, and these have made way for the ongoing supply of new packs and videos sent to us from other DECs and publishing NGOs.

Some of the Library categories have been discontinued in favour of new ones such as 'Citizenship'. We would be glad to hear from you about the areas of interest you feel should be expanded or contracted, and indeed about the content of the Library generally.

As our borrowers are mainly teachers, we have changed the loan period from three weeks to fit in with schools half terms. Loans will in future be until the end of the current half term, or longer by special arrangement. We hope that this will enable teachers to make better use of our resources - and to remember when to return them! (For information on joining and borrowing from the Library, please see back page.)

The World of Tobacco: Turning Over a New Leaf

(Tacade and Roy Castle Lung Cancer Foundation, £47.95)

For many years educationalists have considered 5-7 year olds are too young to learn about smoking. However, recent research undertaken at John Moores University shows that children as young as five are aware of cigarette smoking, even if their parents do not smoke. This resource, part of the 'Skills for the Primary School Child' series, has been developed to address children's concernes as identified in this research.

The book contains 23 lessons divided into five topics areas:

- Our bodies and keeping healthy
- The environment
- Relationships, responsibilities and seeking help
- The tobacco industry
- Image and advertising

This book enables children to increase their knowledge, explore relevant attitudes and values and develop appropriate social skills to enable them to make informed choices. The workshop activities are designed to help teachers, parents and others to develop a whole school approach to smoking education within the life-skills framework.

The full danger of smoking is often not recognised. Over half of all regular smokers eventually die from the habit. In the UK smoking kills more people than traffic accidents, accidental falls, murder, manslaughter, suicide and HIV infection combined. Most regular smokers take up the habit as teenagers. It is therefore essential that young people are given the opportunity to learn about the dangers of smoking and how the tobacco industry targets young people. Information alone is not enough so *The World of Tobacco* provides teachers with the material to help young people develop the skills to make informed choices.
