'A Taste for Action!' – Fairtrade Fortnight

Fairtrade Fortnight (1st to 14th March) is fast approaching and, as mentioned in last term's schools' newsletter, provides a great opportunity to address global trade issues across the curriculum. This year is extraspecial as it's the 10th anniversary of the Fairtrade Mark. Have you thought about what you might do? In this newsletter we hope to give you some practical ideas. We highlight Fairtrade resources available at NEAD; useful websites for accessing information, case studies and further educational resources; and we've included a Fairtrade internet quiz, ready to photocopy and use within the classroom.

What is Fairtrade?

Fairtrade is an alternative approach to conventional world trade. It's a partnership between producers and consumers, which means paying farmers and other workers in the South a fair price for the work they do. This means they can have control over their lives, improve their education, health, living and working conditions, and plan for the future. As active global citizens, we need to be informed consumers - and be aware that the choices we make really do have an impact on other people's lives. The issue of Fairtrade can raise students' awareness of the wider world, and their own role within it. So what can we do during Fairtrade Fortnight to help?

Think Global Act Local...Get Active!

- promote Fairtrade chocolate in your tuckshop.
- promote Fairtrade tea and coffee in the staffroom.

- liaise with the school canteen to hold a Fairtrade breakfast or lunch serving as many Fairtrade items as possible.
- get involved in some of the locally organised events (contact Tonia at NEAD for details).
- organise for a NEAD workshop facilitator to come to the school and run activities on Fairtrade for students.
- organise a stall of Fairtrade products (contact Sam at NEAD's World Shop).
- get a group of students to campaign / lobby their peers to fill in postcards / sign a petition in favour of Fairtrade.
- get your form group to do a school assembly on the issue of Fairtrade.
- set up a competition whereby students design campaign materials for a new Fairtrade campaign (see campaign websites below for ideas) or wrapping for new Fairtrade product. Could link into different curriculum areas.
- Set up a 'Fairtrade Trail', a fun way for students to find out about Fairtrade. Display materials at different locations around the school eg posters/maps/Fairtrade packaging. Students could design the trail themselves.
- Get students to do a survey of what products local supermarkets are selling, eg type / number of Fairtrade items on sale.
- Carry out consumer survey / school survey through devising a questionnaire about people's use of Fairtrade products. Could form a basis for developing a school Fairtrade Policy.

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What resources does NEAD have?

We have a wide range of resources to buy and loan for all key stages. Below we highlight just a few. Please come in and see what else we have!

Games, role plays and simulations are great ways of getting students actively involved in experiencing and understanding complex issues, at the same time as having fun.

- Sowing and Harvesting Through participation in this game, children will begin to understand some of the global issues raised by food, farming and trade. As well as everything required for the simulation, there are also introductory and follow-up activities. Ages 7-11 Oxfam £3.25.
- The Chocolate Trade Game Participants are encouraged to explore a series of international trade issues in this lively activity simulating the experiences of all those involved in chocolate production from cocoa farmers in Ghana to shoppers in the UK. Ages 7-14 Christian Aid £4.00.
- The Paper Bag Game Will you survive? What would you do if you worked 10 hours a day and still didn't have enough money to buy basics for your family? This popular and challenging simulation game has been updated with a new section on child labour. The game shows just how easy it is to work hard for a living and still stay poor. *Ages 9+ Christian Aid* £4.50.

The Clothes Line – Photopack with information/activity booklet looking at the stages in clothes production from cotton being harvested in India to children buying clothes in the UK. Through the concept of Fair trade it links children's own lives with those of people in the South. Activities include India quiz, mapwork, research and word-building activities. *KS2 Oxfam £13.95.*

Go Bananas! – Photopack with information/activity booklet looking at journey of the banana from tree to our tables. Skills developed involve questioning, sequencing, interpreting, research, presenting information and negotiating. *KS2 Oxfam £14.00.*

The Banana Pack - Contains three excellent resources to give you information and ideas for work around bananas and fair trade.

- **The Best of the Bunch** full of information about Fairtrade bananas, and the current situation in the Windward Islands.
- Bananas Unpeeled a video with teaching and action notes looking at life on Latin American banana plantations. It examines the actions of the WTO, and its effects on Caribbean farmers.
- The Truth About Bananas an information and activity pack containing useful background information on banana production and trade, and an action for change section with discussion, role plays and ideas for action. Ages 8-18+ Banana Link £21.10.

Fairtrade in Action – This flexible pack introduces students to the concept of Fairtrade and encourages them to think about their own impact as consumers. It contains: a video featuring banana and cocoa production; producer case studies; Fairtrade Rules, a whole class game which is clearly explained and simple to play. *Ages 11-14 Fairtrade Foundation / RISC £16.00.*

Ethical Trade Posters - A set of 4 posters focusing on the garment and sports shoe industry. Starting with situations that young people are familiar with, the posters are designed to increase their awareness of how their actions, decisions and opinions can influence the lives of people around the world. **KS3/4 NEAD £3.00**.
