

Lamb Inquiry

(Annual Reviews — Parents will have further rights to appeal)

Ed Balls, the Secretary of State for Children, Schools and Families, has accepted the first findings from the Inquiry on SEN and is <u>recommending</u> that the law be changed by:

- OFSTED reporting on the quality of education provided for disabled children and those with SEN
- To give parents the right of appeal if the local

authority does not make changes requested at an annual review

This will not happen immediately; we will let you know through the newsletter when this applies, so make sure your child's school continues to send this newsletter to you.

The Rose Report -

Identifying and Teaching Children and Young People with Dyslexia and Literacy Difficulties

Sir Jim Rose was asked by the government to look into how children with literacy difficulties including dyslexia are being supported at school and to recommend changes. He found there was some good support but that teachers needed more training and advice to recognise and help children with literacy difficulties, particularly dyslexia, earlier.

He said 1-1 support is not essential, that small group work has also been found to be helpful, and it is the quality of the teaching which is important. He suggested how teachers could be supported in teaching and advised these training levels:

Core Skills - All teachers should have at least a working knowledge of how to recognise a child that may have literacy difficulties and know where to go for advice.

Advanced Skills - At least one teacher in each school has this level of skill or there is a partnership arrangement with another school to share a teacher.

Specialist Skills - The Department of Children, Schools and Families (DCSF) should fund a number of teachers to take specialist training. Groups could be formed to share the specialist teacher.

Sir Rose also recommended that:

Schools work with parents to help children overcome their difficulties.

The DCSF to write guidelines for schools and parents about how they can work together to better support children.

Problems can come for parents who are lonely, depressed, bereaved or suffering from illness, Post Natal Depression, for example. The introduction of a supportive 'friend' can play a vital role in the well being of not only the parent but the whole family.

Support, when needed and given at the right time, reduces the potential for family breakdown.

Home-Start volunteers, who are usually parents themselves, visit families in their own homes, where the family's dignity and identity can be respected.

All volunteers attend a basic course of preparation before being linked to families.

Great emphasis is placed on confidentiality throughout.

Transition to Secondary School Service Year 6 Pupils (aged 10-11)



What will happen?

During September 2009 your child will bring home an Admissions Pack with an Application Form and a booklet: 'A parents' guide to secondary schools in Norfolk'.

What should I do now?

Name your preferred schools and return to Admissions before the closing date of 13th November 2009. Or fill your form in online at: www.admissionsonline.norfolk.gov.uk

What if I don't reply?

Your child may not get a place at the secondary school you prefer, or even your catchment school, but will be given a place at the nearest school with spaces.

Please note that this process is different to the one for children moving to high school who have statements.

Norfolk Parent Partnership and Parent Support Advisers (PSA)

Parent Partnership provides an arms length service offering impartial, neutral and accurate advice to parents of children with Special Educational Needs, on educational matters only. It supports on ALL educational issues including the statutory assessment process. Individual Fducation Plans and additional support in school as well as exclusions and attendance. It will signpost parents to services, including the PSA in the school cluster, who can offer support with other issues. Norfolk Parent Partnership covers the whole of Norfolk, following the SEN Code of Practice guidelines.

The Parent Support Adviser's role (PSA) is to reduce exclusions and increase attendance through early support and parenting advice. The role may offer parenting groups or courses.

The PSA will support all families offering advice on issues surrounding the family, including welfare benefits, housing and education. SEN issues will usually be signposted to Parent Partnership. The PSA is based within school cluster groups.
