Jane Weir's poetry has been widely published in anthologies and magazines including Out of Fashion (Faber: 2005), Answering Back (Picador: 2007), PN Review, Ulster Tatler (2008), The Forward Book of Poetry(2007), International Sonnet Competition Prize Anthology (2008). Her winning poem from the 2008 Wigtown Poetry Competition, 'On the Recommendation of Ovid We Tried a Weasel', is one of two published in the 2009 Forward Book of Poetry. Jane was mentioned by Carol Ann Duffy in the Guardian interview following her appointment as Poet Laureate as one of the new voices in contemporary poetry. salthouse 2010: workshop proposal form

In conjunction with its annual contemporary art exhibition at Salthouse Church, the North Norfolk Exhibition Project (NNEP) runs a programme of workshops for a range of participants which may include primary and high school groups, adults, community groups (e.g. youth clubs) and specialist groups (e.g. those working in the care professions). NNEP has a set budget for running workshops: £175 per full day artist's fee and normally £45 for materials.

NNEP workshops may take place in Columbia Hall in Salthouse, in the Churchyard, a care workers base, a school, youth group or other location on the proposed Salthouse Sculpture Trail extending out of the village. If you are interested in running a workshop, please complete this form (a separate form for each workshop proposal please) and include supplementary information e.g. CV and images. Notes on Workshops:

- 1. If you consider your workshop to be suitable for school groups (primary or high), please bear in mind the duration of the school day and allow for travel to and from the venue (e.g. the maximum length of the workshop is likely to be 4.5 hours including a break for lunch). Also, most schools would need to be able to bring a whole class to make the excursion feasible; therefore you would need to allow for approx 30 children. If you are unable to cater for this volume in the time available, then your proposal will not be considered appropriate for school groups. Finally, workshops for schools can only be considered if they fall within term time i.e. Monday Friday up to 23rd July 2010.
- 2. If you consider your proposal to be suitable for adults, please bear in mind that we charge for these workshops and that they will only proceed if we have sufficient bookings to make them financially viable. We would therefore expect an adult workshop to cater for a minimum of 10, but preferably 14+ people. We expect all selected tutors for adult workshops to actively promote their workshop to ensure that it goes ahead and to handle all bookings and enquiries. Adult workshops usually run for one day (although sometimes over a weekend) in the British Columbia Hall in Salthouse from 10am-4pm with a break for lunch.
- 3. Our carers/specialist group workshops are free and tend to attract a mixture of carers and clients with varying abilities. We would expect these workshops to provide easily transferable and affordable skills and techniques to take back to the workplace. Carers workshops may take place in Salthouse or at a day/residential centre elsewhere in North Norfolk and would normally last from 10am-4pm with a break for lunch.

- 4. Generally, the more specific you can be about your target group, the number of participants and the content of your workshop proposal, the easier it is for the committee to make a decision. Whilst we will consider proposals which fall outside our budget, we prefer applicants to try to work within the parameters set (i.e. £175 fee + £45 materials).
- 5. Finally, we welcome applications which may cater for and attract new groups to Salthouse e.g. older people, migrant workers or single parent families; particularly if you have contacts/experience to make this happen. We also welcome workshop activities which may take place outside on a drop-in basis and in-situ, resulting in a piece of work which remains for others to enjoy for the duration of the exhibition or even longer. Such proposals however, may need to be approved by the Curator, the PCC at Salthouse Church or another body depending on the location.

National Young Filmmakers' Award 2010 deadline: 18 December 2009

The National Young Filmmakers' Award (NYFA) is currently open for entries. Now in its seventh year, the Awards showcase the best new filmmaking talent in the UK and is looking for the best short films from the movie makers of the future.

Films can be of any type - fiction, documentary or animation and any genre - horror, comedy, drama, scifi, fantasy, etc as long as they are under 10 minutes and have been made in the last year. All shortlisted films will be screened at a special event in the 2010 Leeds Young People's Film Festival in front of a panel of industry specialists including filmmakers, producers, journalists and funders. The winning films in each age group will receive a £250 cash prize towards their next project. The competition is open to any young filmmakers aged from zero to 19.

The Colwinston Charitable Trust deadline: 28 February 2010

The Colwinston Charitable Trust was established in 1995 by its founder Mr Mathew Prichard CBE, and distributes grants to UK registered charitable organisations working predominantly in the areas of opera, classical music and the visual arts.

The Trust derives its income from the royalties from the West End production of The Mousetrap, the Agatha Christie play that opened in London in 1952, and is now the longest running play in history. The Trustees are seeking particularly the support of charitable organisations in the UK, (especially Wales), the dominant purposes of which are to benefit opera/music theatre, classical music, and the visual arts. Tudor Trust Grants Programme (UK)

The Tudor Trust, one of the largest independent grant making trusts in the UK has announced new funding guidelines for the period 2009 – 11. Under the new guidelines, the Trust will continue to make grants across their established funding areas. These are; youth, older people, community, relationships, housing, mental health, substance misuse, learning, financial security and criminal justice. The Trust will also be open to hearing about work in areas the Trust has not funded before. The Trust makes grants in the region of £19 million per year and aims to support smaller community, voluntary and charitable organisations and is looking to make around 350 projects per year for up to three years. Grants can take the form of core funding (including salaries and running costs), development funding, project grants or capital grants for buildings or equipment. There is no maximum or minimum grant amount that an organisation can apply for. Applications can be submitted at any time. Young Brits at Art Awards

The Equality and Human Rights Commission (EHRC) is re-launching Young Brits at Art, its national arts awards for 11 to 19 year olds, for the current academic year. Last year's Young Brits at Art was very successful, receiving 1,639 entries from England, Scotland and Wales.

It now aims to build on last year's success and get more schools and youth centres involved by providing new and innovative resources that support the teaching of arts and citizenship as well as ongoing work with young people outside the school system. It will also host 45 artist-led workshops, with a particular emphasis on young people from disabled, hard to reach and vulnerable backgrounds.
